23 SAJE folks enjoyed a mini tour of Bissinger's Chocolatier where they learned a bit of history and enjoyed a delicious lunch. Their day trip was on Wednesday, March 20, 2019. Bissinger's is located on the north end of downtown St. Louis in a historic building that used to be a maintenance and repair shop for rail cars. But Bissinger's roots were first established in Paris, France in 1668 and became well-known for its superb chocolate confections (not to be confused with candy) and so impressed the members of the royal court that kings and queens enjoyed this yummy treat. This inspired King Louis XIV to issue a royal crest.

William Edwards led the SAJE Senior Ministry tour. He has been employed with Bissinger's for about five years. He said that they nearly always promote employees from within the company.

Edwards made a point early in the tour that Bissinger's Chocolatiers is a member of the Rainforest Alliance. "The Rainforest Alliance works with independent farmers to source their chocolate using the fair trade of chocolate," said Edwards. "We want to make sure that these farmers are not using child labor where some kids work 16 hours a day." The Rainforest Alliance makes sure that chocolate is properly sourced to help protect the environment. They also make sure that 2.47 million acres of farm land is not damaged. "Chocolate comes from South America, Africa and Asia," continued Edwards, "but we get our chocolate from Africa because it's more chocolatey."

It was in 1845 that the first member of the Bissinger family, Karl Bissinger, Sr., moved his operations to Cincinnati. In 1927 Bissinger's then moved to St. Louis and located its first facility in the Central West End at Gratiot and Vandeventer before finally moving to their current location in 2014.

Karl Frederick Bissinger, Sr. died leaving his wife Theresa in charge of the company. She then sold the company to the employees for \$1 because Bissingers were artisans and not interested in the daily running of the business. The employees then sold the company in 1982 to Bud Kolebrenner.

The tour was then followed by lunch in the Chocolate Shoppe provided by 23 Cross Streets Catering that consisted of thick turkey and cheese sandwiches, handmade chips, a cookie and beverage.

Julia Koziacki of Immaculate Heart of Mary Catholic Church offered her version of the tour. "I didn't know chocolate comes from outside the country," said Koziacki.

Sandy Schmidt of All Saints Catholic Church said she learned something new as well. "I learned not to put chocolate in the refrigerator."

The day was not complete without the purchase of goodies for the tourists to take home that offered them a 10% discount.

Straight & Tough Talk, about Opiates and Addiction March Lunch & Learn

At the March Lunch & Learn there were about 30 neighbors that joined together to listen and learn about the opioid and heroin addiction endemic that is in our back yards. This presentation was given by Erin Kelley of Step Up St Louis - Landon Roberts of NCADA, National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse and a local parent and grandmother, Kathy Williams.

In all matters related to alcohol, tobacco, and other drug abuse, the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse – St. Louis Area (NCADA) has been the place to turn since 1965, they work directly with communities, schools and other groups as well as individuals to share information on prevention and detection. NCADA also serves as a guide for addicts and their loved ones to the proper resources that are available. They serve in seven nearby counties: the city of St. Louis, St. Louis County, the counties of Jefferson, Franklin, St. Charles, Warren and Lincoln.

Erin Kelley, Executive Director at Step Up of St. Louis (a federally funded organization) said their role is to figure out strategies to lead kids away from substance misuse, and show them that they are valued in our community, by getting community leaders involved.

Kathy, shared her story of being a mother and grandmother traveling, with God's help down this unplanned path. She stressed that education through the NCADA and the support of groups like, H.O.P.E. (Hope for Opiate Addicts Parents Exists) and her own spiritual life has made all the difference in the world to her family's story.

"I liked the informal talk," said Myrna Mohnlock-Smith of Salem Lutheran Church in Affton.

The most intriguing part of the talk is the variety of people addiction effects, according to Ann Mantler of St. Thomas/Holy Spirit Lutheran Church in Sunset Hills. "It can happen to adults, young people and teens. It's the different types of drugs," said Mantler.

Jim Rode of Advent Episcopal Church thought the talk was a very appropriate subject. "It's something my family went through," stated Rode. "Nice to know other people went through it too."



Missouri Aviation History with Dan O'Hara April Lunch & Learn

Over 40 folks gathered to be flown off into Missouri Aviation History!

Enthusiasm shows on the face of Dan O'Hara

Founder of Missouri Aviation Historical Society's Dan O'Hara loves all manner of aircraft and enjoys sharing his enthusiasm with others. His slide show with all types of aircraft and spoke about all the men (and one woman) who have been instrumental in the history of Missouri's aviation. He guided us through the mid-1800s balloon era all the way to today's Boeing F/A-18 Super Hornet, as well as WWII aviation and the early space race. Browsing an antique shop near Hannibal, O'Hara discovered there was no unifying group about aviation history. O'Hara founded the Missouri Aviation Historical Society in 2007. He discovered fascinating facts across the state that he shared. He wanted to honor all the people involved in the Missouri Aviation Hall of Fame and they'll be taking two nominations per year.

Balloon races started in downtown St. Louis because winds blew from the east. Another reason for holding the races downtown was because Laclede Gas had a great supply [of gases]. "If you tried a balloon race on the East Coast," said O'Hara, "the balloons would end up over the Atlantic Ocean."

Before O'Hara began his presentation, local resident Jane Saulze, a member of St. Peter's Catholic Church in Kirkwood shared pictures of aircraft that her uncle had of a collage at his home in Calif. He had worked on the Blue Goose when it was first introduced.

George Hettenhausen, a member of St. Lucas Lutheran Church on Morgan Ford shared why he liked the presentation. "I liked the whole thing," stated Hettenhausen. "St. Louis has a long history and Dan touched on everything. He showed us the transition of Lambert Field to what it is today."

"We're [St. Louis] still involved in aviation and the space program," said Meder. "I like how [aviation] is turning around in history and how it really reveals himself. Meder said he had an uncle who flew bombers in England during World War II and sometimes the weather effected their flights.







The Plan of Care

A *Plan of Care* is a record of the care and treatment a person needs. The Plan helps you and anyone who assists you with caregiving tasks, especially when a patient leaves the hospital. The discharge planner provides the largiver with a copy of the doctor's orders and a brief set of instructions for *medical* care to include in the Plan.

The Plan shows:

- diagnosis
- medications
- functional limitations
- a list of equipment needed
- specific diet
- detailed care instructions

This information is presented in a pecific order so that the process of care becomes repetitive and routine. When the Plan is kept up to date, it provides a clear record of events that is helpful both in solving and in avoiding problems. The Plan also keeps you from having to rely on your memory and allows anothe person to take over respite care or take your place with a minimum of disruption.

Making and Recording the Plan of Care

To record a Plan of Care, use a loc se-leaf notebook. Put a copy of the doctor's instructions on the inside front cover. After using your Plan of Care for one week, make necessary adjustments and continue to do so as the person's needs change. Always adjust to what works for you and the person being cared for. Use notes, pictures, or whatever it takes to describe your responsibilities. Also, use plack ink, not pencil, to maintain a permanent record.
